Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I, send me!"

From the earliest times, God has been in the business of recruiting preachers and missionaries. He called Abraham, Moses, Isaiah, and the other prophets. Jesus

was just as intentional in His personal ministry. He shouldertapped Peter, Andrew, James, and John, challenging them to become "fishers of men" (Mark 1:16-20). He appointed them, along with eight others, to be His apostles "that they might be with him and that he might send them out to preach" (Mark 3:14).

There has never been a greater need for preachers and missionaries than today. More and more congregations in our country are without preachers. In foreign countries, people are languishing in sin without a gospel spokesman. There has never been a greater need for parents to encourage their children, for church leaders to shoulder tap their best and brightest, and for congregations to step up their support of preacher training. There has never been a greater need for willing volunteers to say "Here am I, send me."

Jpportunity Knocks

The Woodward Park Church of Christ in Fresno, CA, and the Sunset International Bible Institute (SIBI) in Lubbock, TX, want to announce to our brotherhood the establishment of a new preacher training facility in Mexicali, Mexico. The Latin American Bible Institute, LABI, is scheduled to begin classes on August 24th of this year. The dormitories have been completed, the classrooms are under construction, the teaching staff has been assembled, and equipment is being purchased.

The school will initially have a capacity to house 32 students, who will be taught in a two-year program with curriculum provided by Sunset to take the whole gospel to the Spanish-speaking world. However, as soon as the school is up and running, we will begin satellite schools in several additional locations including Fresno, CA, where we will utilize interactive video-conferencing and top quality instructors from around the country. The goals are four-fold: (1) to establish the New Testament church in those communities where it does not currently exist, (2) to attract Spanish-speaking people to established congregations, (3) to build a unity in Christ that bridges language, culture, and ethnicity, and (4) to win souls to Christ and disciple them to maturity.

This is an exciting, bold, and comprehensive outreach. There is one hurdle to be crossed before the school's opening, raising the funds to provide scholarships for the students. We can support them for \$350 to \$450 each per month. We are now seeking what we call "Chair Partners" who will join us in supporting students in the school. This funding will go to beginning students while they are in school, and when they graduate the funding will go to another beginning student. You can help make this possible by partnering with us to sponsor one or more chairs.

The new school sits on the same property as the Mexicali church, where Esteban Lopez has been the minister for 35 years and has established a reputation among the people. The church is growing and has many involved young families. When we recently helped with a VBS in Mexicali, approximately 40 children showed up on the first day. The next day we had about 80, and the numbers continued to grow. The picture above could have been taken in Dos Palos, CA, or Mexicali, Mexico, or in your community. This is the most comprehensive outreach to the Hispanic community our brotherhood has ever undertaken, and we invite you to be a part of it.

Ed Wharton Jeaches in Singapore

reginning March 24 through April 21, 2009, Ed taught The Scheme of Redemption in the international school in Singapore. The school is not yet in session full-time, but there were Several students auditing the class. The intent of the Sunset International Bible Institute -Singapore (SIBIS) is to bring Chinese students from the small house churches in Mainland China to Singapore and keep them for a term or for the two years it takes to graduate with a Bachelor of Bibilical Studies.

At this time, the Pasir Panjang church will host the school. The church is planning to build an upper story on their church building which will house the students. Attendance at the Pasir Panjang congregation was 280 about 3 years ago, but now there are 397 in attendance. Souls are being saved. Ed plans to return to teach in the Singapore school annually until Chinese teachers can be trained. Ed taught alongside Charles Cook (former Sunset instructor in missions) and Tom Goracke, '95. Both men and families have done a tremendous work in Singapore.

Please continue to pray for the school in Singapore. The school faced several obstacles, including government restrictions and lmited student housing. God is still in control and our prayer is that the school will be running full time in the near future.

TAKING RESPONSIBILITY

Recently I had the blessing of interviewing Behailu Abebe, a great man of God who has served the Lord in Ethiopia for more than 40 years. God has used him to help in leading thousands to Christ, saving hundreds of thousands of lives through clean water development projects, planting churches, and beginning more than a dozen formal schools that either train preachers or educate the destitute and handicapped. The preacher training schools are graduating 120 preachers per year, and the schools for the deaf and poor educate more than 800 deaf children and hundreds of destitute Ethiopian children each year. Since 2002, Behailu's ministry has participated in digging 263 water wells that now provide fresh water to 1.5 million Ethiopians. God has worked in wonderful ways in Ethiopia over the past 40 years.

Bahailu is adamant that a significant reason the ministry has flourished in Ethiopia is because from the time the Churches of Christ landed on the ground those early missionaries emphasized raising up indigenous leaders and funding ministry with indigenous

money. He believes that Ethiopians have begun taking ownership in what God wants to do through them, and that is why the church is taking off in Ethiopia. He remains adamant that Ethiopians need to fund and lead their own churches rather than being dependent on American missionaries and support. And, with God's help, they are doing so.


It makes me wonder what we can learn from this example. We seem to be in a regressive process in our society, and this may be infecting the theology of the church. As we seek to do better with the less fortunate than we have in the past, let's not give in to thinking that dependency is good for people or that it's God's desire for them. Let's seek wellness and blessing for one another. This will require more time, energy, and money. It will likely mean owning up to mistakes that we have made as churches, as well as mistakes made by those who are in need of help. This is the hard path to healing. There is rarely an easy one.


Thomas Sowell said in a column recently, "We (Americans) seem to be moving steadily in the direction of a society where no one is responsible for what he himself did, but we are all responsible for what somebody else did, either in the present or in the past." I agree with his assessment. Ethiopians, of all people, have good reason to be dependent on whomever, and no one could blame them. They suffered immensely through Communist takeover/persecution and the most severe famine the earth has ever seen. Nevertheless, they understood that dependency is not God's plan for them, and are now doing things in their own land that we Americans can't seem to do in our own.

Perhaps we can take a cue from our brothers and sisters in Ethiopia, and strive to be a society in which we all understand that we are owed nothing, but given much. What we do with what has been entrusted to us is something we will be held accountable for some day. This shouldn't scare us, but rather inspire us to do whatever we can with the time, talent, and treasure that's been entrusted to us by God. This reality should shape how we minister to and among the poor.

l very year in many places, the scholar cycle ends in May or June. Before thinking of returning the next semester, students delight in the fact that they have many weeks ahead of spare time. There is another group of people who will become students as soon as the summer is over. This group of people must go through the admission process and perhaps obtain financial aid. I remember last year during this time when my family and I were going through a similar process. As early as March, my wife and I had decided to come to Sunset International Bible Institute. The process sometimes seemed slow and uncertain, and during that time my father was diagnosed with a brain tumor. The majority of our financial support did not come until the end of <mark>June, and our studen</mark>t visas were approved just one week before our planned departure from Mexico to Lubbock. We arrived in Lubbock on Wednesday before school started without a place to stay, with just our personal belongings and nothing more. I wish I could share our trip pictures with you, but we lost our camera and pictures during the first week of classes. In spite of everything we went through during those first months, God worked in many wonderful ways to bring us to Sunset and provided us with

safety, allowing us to become established in a different country, a new home, and a new life. I could list many specific things that I am grateful for, but I would like to say that the greatest blessing of all has been to dedicate our time to study and preaching of the Word of God.

Today, I know there are many brothers and sisters, singles and whole families, who have decided to come to Sunset to prepare for the ministry of God's word. They are facing situations that cause them to have doubts about their outcome when summer is over. They are asking themselves questions. Am I going to be able to raise enough financial support? Am I ready to move away from my current profession? Is this really what God wants me to do? Am I prepared for the rigorous study that will be required? Consider the brothers and sisters who may be going through this process today. Encourage them to trust in the Lord. Send them a letter and offer your prayer support. You are invited to join us in prayer each Friday morning when we lift prospective students up to our God, trusting that He will "work within them, you and me," for the glory and praise of His name (Eph. 3:20-21).
