Gerald Paden 1924-2015

T he year 2015 will long be remembered in the annals of SIBI as a year of phenomenal gains, huge losses and blessings from God too numerous to count.

Among the losses, if they can be called that, are the many faculty, alumni, missionaries, and significant donors and partners in ministry who passed from this life to their eternal reward this year. Notable among those listed are Gerald Paden, Jo Iris Paden, Alex Strachan, Harvie Pruitt, Mike Dawidow, A.D. Smith, Reta Clark and Marguerite Gray, all of whom served in significant roles in various SIBI programs. Added to that, we lost a larger than usual number of alumni who were out faithfully preaching and teaching God's word. When a school is more than half a century old, it may be expected that earlier graduates and faculty will begin to "go home" at a faster rate. Their legacy lives on and their works are carried on admirably by recent graduates, new faculty members and a new generation of supporters.

Also among the losses in 2014 was the closing of one of our finest international schools, the Ukrainian Bible Institute in Donetsk, Ukraine. The school was closed due to the incursion of Russian separatists, turning Donetsk into a war zone. This year we were able to reopen the school in Kiev, Ukraine, but the operations costs are greater because we had to leave behind in Donetsk our beautifully remodeled building with classrooms, dormitory space for the students and offices for faculty. That building was owned free and clear, but we have had to replace all that with rented facilities in Kiev. Thankfully our brotherhood is rallying to help pay the difference.

One of the biggest stories of 2015 is the success of Solar Player Phase II. We have been told that it is very difficult to add a second year to a million dollar funding project like this. As this is written, we have almost reached our \$1 million funding goal and are 75% completed in distributing

2,000 more solar players. Perhaps most significant is our first "foreign language" version of the solar player as 500 are being prepared for Ethiopia in the Amharic language. We will soon be releasing a huge announcement about the Spanish language version which will be unveiled in 2016 and the nations that will be included in that distribution. We will be asking for brotherhood involvement and partnership in that exciting venture.

Speaking of innovative technology, a brand new e-Sword Bible program module will be released this month featuring the Sunset commentary series. A generous donor made it possible for us to develop this program over a couple of years. It will be a great addition to your Bible study tools.

Added to the success was the graduation of a large class of preachers and missionaries who will serve in a number of stateside congregations and at least eight foreign countries. By God's grace we have added two significant ministries to our roster, ministering both locally and around the world. We have also been blessed with a new faculty member who will greatly broaden our outreach to a segment of our population that we have not been effective in reaching.

Last but not least, our SIBI Foundation has set a goal to develop a \$20 million endowment by the year 2020. The Foundation staff will be offering estate planning seminars to facilitate those who would like to join our Legacy Circle by naming SIBI in their planned giving.














Gerald Paden 1924-2015


erald S. Paden, age 90, long-time Lubbock resident and lifelong teacher and preacher, died on July 20, 2015. On August 17, 1924, Gerald was born alongside his twin sister Geraldine to Oscar and Lona Paden in Commerce, Texas. He joined a family of older siblings, Mildred, Ivan, Cline, and Harold, then welcomed younger sister Patsy. The family moved to Lubbock County where he graduated from Idalou High School. During those lean Dust Bowl years, the family regularly competed in declamation competitions, practicing their pieces while hoeing on the farm thus paving the way, years later, to a life-time love of teaching and preaching. Gerald enlisted in the Navy in 1943, serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Shipley Bay, CVE 85. He was honorably discharged in 1946, after which he married Bobbie Rhea Johnson. After their marriage, Gerald attended and graduated from Abilene Christian College and became a preacher for the Church of Christ in Meadow (1951 - 1953) and later in New Home (1960 - 1963). In 1953, Gerald followed his brothers Cline and Harold into overseas mission work, serving in Rome and Pisa, Italy, and planted small churches in the surrounding cities. Gerald taught himself to be an eloquent speaker of the Italian language, and with his Bible study, research, and many publications, became a sought-after lecturer in Italy and other European cities. Returning to Lubbock in 1971, Gerald joined the faculty of Sunset School of Preaching (now Sunset International Bible School), where he remained until his last days. No

one who knew Gerald believes he could have done this without the love, support and encouragement of his beloved wife and co-laborer, Miss Bobbie. Along with her, he leaves behind his younger sister, Patsy Paden Whitson; his three children Joe Michael Paden and wife Lynn, Cynthia Paden Jennings and husband Mack, Ted Paden and wife Lura; grandchildren, Joshua, Scott, Lindsey, Andrew, Danny, Nick, Gabriel, and six great-grandchildren.

To say that Gerald was important to Sunset would be a grand understatement. His character was woven into its fabric and has helped to make the school what it is today. His mission heart and love for the lost of every nation continues to be passed on to students who come to the school. Most of the current instructors in the residential school and in many of the international schools sat at the feet of this master teacher. His legacy of teaching will continue for many generations. His students will never forget how he taught of the forgiveness and love of God from the Letters of John or his in-depth teaching of the shadow and reality of the Sacrificial System and sacrifice of Christ on the cross.

It would be wrong to say that Sunset will never be the same without Gerald Paden. Sunset is what it is today and will continue to be what it is in the Kingdom because of the integral part that Gerald Paden had helping us be who we are. Sunset is grateful to God for blessing us with a "workman that needeth not to be ashamed, handling aright the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15, ASV)





n 2014, Sunset launched a bold new challenge for the church: Lsend 2,000 solar-powered audio players loaded with 400 hours of the Bible and biblical teaching. The vision was to provide comprehensive biblical training for those who have no access to such resources. It seems that it was just the right time for such an initiative. The technology was mature and stable; the material was complete and proven through years of use; and the distribution system was in place through a groundwork of mission efforts through Sunset and many other churches and institutions. The Solar Event was a bold new idea that had not been attempted to such a scale by such a group of people.

Truitt Adair, president of Sunset International Bible Institute, began working towards this effort a few years prior to the official Solar Event. Lifeline readers may remember appeals made for remote village players back in 2013. At that time, a few donors were willing to help fund this new activity and saw the dramatic effects that this new mission method was having with the limited resources available.

Sunset officially launched Phase I of the Solar Event at the Sunset Vision Workshop, January 23, 2014. The goal was to provide 2,000 solar-powered audio players to the three African nations of Zimbabwe, Ghana, and Liberia. Hundreds of churches and individuals quickly saw the potential for growing the Kingdom of God and helped to provide \$500 for each solar-powered audio player. To God's glory the Lord's Church helped to complete the funding of \$1,000,000 by the end of May 2014.

The next challenge was in the distribution of these solar players. The goal was to place each player into the hands of Christian leaders within each nation. These leaders would then use these devices for the growth of the Kingdom through both their own personal study and enrichment and in sharing the messages contained with those around them so that the Kingdom would grow by providing deeper knowledge and developing more leaders.

Tim Burow, dean of International Studies, made the first of many trips in April 2014 to the Mutare School of Preaching in Zimbabwe, one of Sunset's international associate schools. With the help of the leaders there, Tim was able to place solar players in the hands of graduates of the school and began to hear of new and inventive ways that these Gospel preachers were dreaming of using this new tool.

Not long before the country of Liberia was closed because of the outbreak of Ebola, Chris Swinford was able to deliver a shipment of solar players. This proved to be a life-changing effort for some that were able to hear the Gospel through the solar players at a time when they were quarantined from the world. We were told of stories of those that were baptized before succumbing to the epidemic. The solar players continue to be an invaluable tool in that country as preachers spread out preaching and teaching.

The trips to Ghana revealed a nation and a church desperate for the depth of knowledge in the Scriptures. Travelling preachers welcomed the device to enable them to continue growing

Nhamo Marunga, Director of the Mutare School of Preaching in Zimbabwe, continues to give us reports of how the solar players are making an impact in his country. A local minister from a denominational church asked to borrow a solar player and has since asked if he can bring more people from his congregation to hear the in-depth Bible teaching. The school is using the players to send out with students that are returning to villages to preach. The students then use the lessons to continue studying for courses. When they return to Mutare, they are ready for testing and to hand in any papers. This has allowed many preachers to continue their studies while remaining active in ministry.

congregations when they were not able to be around.

From April through December, seven trips were made by eight faculty members to the targeted countries to distribute all of the solar players. We immediately began to hear back from the recipients about their innovative ways of using their new tools in the Kingdom. Some were using them to teach Bible in public schools, some were using the lessons on evangelism to convert new souls to Christ, many used them to help them prepare

their lessons and some used them to teach in prisons. The Kingdom began to grow both in numbers and in depth of knowledge.

Back at Sunset, Tim Burow, Truitt Adair and many others continued to receive requests from churches and nations desperate to be recipients of solar players. Many churches that had never supported Sunset before caught the vision and the potential for this new mission method and supported the Solar Event with generous donations that confirmed the need and desire to begin planning Phase II. The only question remained was where to go next.

Phase II

In Phase I material was targeted to English speakers. By most estimates, English is spoken by the second largest population of the world. Only Chinese is larger. Since Sunset's courses were all in English, it made it easier to distribute in just English.

As the project continued though, the need to translate the audio courses into other languages became readily apparent. Sunset's associate schools in Ethiopia have been one of the cornerstones of our international program. Led Behailu bv Abebe, this ministry was enthralled by the potential of solar players for their country. They took the initiative and began recording in Amharic the 40 courses that they had in English. Habtu Zemech worked tirelessly to arrange and equip the teachers from the schools in Ethiopia to record the classes. Many did this work in the late hours of the night after teaching and ministering in the schools. Because of their

tenacity and ingenuity, it was the

right choice to be the first language


for the solar players.

Learning from Phase I, the delivery trips were planned in advance and the first deliveries were in Kenya in February. Not having an associate school in Kenya, Sunset reached out to the Saturn Road Church of Christ of Garland, Texas, that has been supporting works in that country for many years. Sunset used that congregation's influence and relationships with many hundreds of preachers to hold a nation-wide preacher meeting where the

Isaac Kibor sold a goat and some sheep to pay for a bus to take him 12 hours to receive a solar player. Isaac has no use of his legs. He moves around by pulling himself on his hands. Isaac is just one who values the training from the Word of God and these solar players above any price we might have to pay. As Tim Burow has stated, "It means the world to them."

Phase III and beyond

As Phase II finishes, Sunset is already laying the groundwork for Phase III. Phase III of the Solar Event will be in Spanish. The process has already begun by collecting all of the material that Sunset has done over the past few decades in Spanish. Many years ago, Miguel Arroyo voiced the translation of the courses from English to Spanish. Other classes have been recorded by our partner school, Texas International Bible Institute, led by Steve Austin and Kevin Montgomery. All of that material is being compiled and edited to be in the right format for the audio menus on the solar players. In the coming months Arthur Puente, the International Dean of Latin America, will be determining the most effective places to distribute the solar players in Central and South America.

The funds from Phase I and Phase II continue to be a resource to help get the arduous task of translation accomplished. Languages for continuing phases are being investigated and follow-up progress with the seven countries that have already received solar players continues.

The vision of the Solar Events is to help the "Sonlight" spread to the most remote places on earth. It uses the power of the sun to teach about the Son. It has begun in the dark continent of Africa, but as the sunlight drives away the darkness across the globe, the vision is for the Light of God's Word to spread around the world.

Ministry Training in Ukraine Survives the Long Perilous Winter

ver the past year, our brethren in Ukraine have gone through complete upheaval. In May of 2014, one of Sunset's strongest associate international schools in Donetsk, Ukraine, closed due to the danger and persecution. Two church buildings in the area were taken over by separatists. Sasha Kolbez, a preacher in Donetsk, was kidnapped for a time, and many members of the church suffered damage from attacks in the area.

The decision was made to move the school out of the conflicted area in eastern Ukraine to Kiev. With much assistance from brethren committed to seeing the work continue, the school was able to reopen in February of 2015. It was no small operation to move a school that was well established with many resources to a new city. Many expenses were incurred both for the school and the students that needed to move.

The 14th annual graduation ceremony at the Ukrainian Bible Institute was a significant step in returning to normal for the students and staff. Graduation is always a special event, but this particular event was significant in a couple of ways. First, this graduation had been postponed due to the fighting in eastern Ukraine and their flight to safety in Kiev. Secondly, for the staff and faculty members who gave up their homes and left behind friends

and family in Donetsk, this graduation marked a new beginning in the life of the school.

The Ukrainian Bible Institute may never be totally "normal" again if that means returning to the former building or being in Donetsk again, but our Lord works in some amazing ways. The school building in Donetsk now serves as a sanctuary and safe haven for several families who have lost their homes and fled the fighting. The same classrooms where our students learned the word of God are now filled with people who are experiencing the love of God in a very tangible way.

With the help of a generous donor, in December 2014 Sunset issued a \$25,000 Matching Challenge. The goal was met and exceeded. The generous response of the church to the challenge helped the Bible institute relocate from Donetsk to Kiev. Your gifts assisted the staff to find housing and continue their ministry to prepare leaders and preachers for Ukraine.

With the new term has come a new challenge. The fall term started with almost 30 people. These students want to be adequately prepared to minister to others and serve the Lord. A recent assessment of the needs of the school has determined that \$23,000 in additional funds are needed for Sunset's training in Ukraine. We are seeking your help to continue our efforts and expand our student body in Ukraine. Please consider helping this work continue.

We anxiously wait to see how our Heavenly Father will work through UBI to expand His Kingdom and touch the lives of so many people.

Even after his retirement, he remained on the Board of Trustees of LCU and continued to teach classes and take active roles in helping the university whenever he could. He taught Bible classes at Broadway Church of Christ, Sunset Church of Christ and other congregations until just a few years prior to his death. He performed hundreds of weddings and funerals throughout the country and his hard work in preparing for each occasion was a source of wonder and admiration from the family and friends of those concerned.

ccording to the National Institute of Deafness and Other Communication Disorders, 28 million Americans suffer from a hearing impairment. Approximately 2 to 3 out of every 1,000 children in the United States are born deaf or hard-of-hearing. This means that in the area of Lubbock, Texas, there may be as many as 600-900 Deaf. This should not be surprising since American Sign Language is the third most commonly used language in the United States. Although deaf people make up a significant part of the world's population, they are often overlooked and neglected. Few churches in our brotherhood offer any interpreting for deaf members or evangelistic outreach into their deaf communities. Many Deaf do not attend church because there is simply no church to attend.

Many Deaf grow up never hearing the story of Jesus. Even deaf children fortunate enough to have been born into Christian homes commonly reach adulthood without hearing the Gospel. There are many deaf men and women who grew up in Christian homes and attended services regularly with their hearing parents. As boys and girls they sat in silence on pews, watching the preachers lips move, yet never knowing who the man on the cross was, how He got there or that He died for their sins. The sad truth is that most parents never develop communication skills sufficient to share the message of Christ with their own deaf children.

In truth, Deaf around the world are left in darkness without knowledge of the truth. If the Gospel isn't taught in the home, and the Gospel is not taught in the

schools, and the Gospel is not being interpreted in our churches, they will never hear. Romans 10:14-15 says, "How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!'" Without capable deaf men trained in the Bible ready to teach other Deaf and without hearing men and women willing to interpret, the Gospel message will remain unheard by the Deaf.

In contrast to this dark picture, God has lit a flame at Sunset. For nearly 38 years Sunset International Bible Institute has been training and equipping the Deaf to preach and teach in deaf congregations. Hearing men and women are taught American Sign Language, and they are prepared for church interpreting. Graduates of our Deaf Ministry Program have taken the Gospel to mission fields in Philippines, Ethiopia, Thailand, Mexico, Kenya, Romania, Czech Republic, Singapore, Ecuador, Jamaica, South Africa, Nicaragua, and Trinidad. Sunset has acted as a catalyst launching Deaf graduates into ministries spread across the United States. According to those working in Deaf ministry, Sunset International Bible Institute is the only school in our brotherhood with a program tailored for the Deaf. Sunset is working to bring the light of truth to those Deaf yet in darkness. Though the need is great, Sunset has answered the call, saying, "Here am I send me."




