es, Sunset Means the World, but the United States of America must be a significant part of that world ministry. There has never been a time when the spiritual need in our own nation has been greater. America is rapidly losing her moral compass, and Christian values are disappearing. The growing list of moral failures in American society is evident for most Christians, but what to do about it is not as apparent for many of our brethren.

Without diminishing our international ministry involvements, it is time for Sunset to help lead the charge to address the spiritual needs in our own communities, cities, states and nation. We cannot do everything, and we cannot solve all the nation's moral and spiritual ills, but we can and will respond with the gifts, talents and resources that God supplies.

Here are a few things we would like to initiate or expand, with your help, to address our nation's growing moral and spiritual needs:

Training More American Ministers—There is a diminishing supply of preachers for congregations and communities here. Our goal is to double the number we are training and sending out to American communities over the next five years by greatly expanding our recruiting efforts and increasing our scholarships.

Future Preacher/Leader Camp—We need to begin earlier to steer young people toward preaching and spiritual leadership by beginning a camp for sixth graders through high school. We must try harder to help shape the spiritual future of our youth.

Interactive Training Sites—Not everyone can move to Lubbock to study, so we are expanding our interactive training sites from our current one site to six in order to allow more students in local congregations to have a real-time window into our classroom to prepare for ministry.

Congregational Leadership Training—Many local congregations are hurting for more and better leaders, so we are beginning the Sunset Academy of Leadership Training (SALT). Potential leaders will be invited to Sunset for seminar training, and we will take these seminars to strategic sites to accommodate leaders in various regions.

Campus Ministry—Our secular college campuses present a wonderful opportunity to evangelize the unsaved and to affirm faith in the saved while they are young. We are initiating a campus ministry using AIMers as they return from 15 months on their mission field. Those who qualify will be directed to participating campus ministries and provided with scholarship money to enroll in a neighboring university and evangelize and be a godly influence while they work on their degrees.

Church Planting—Churches in many communities are growing old and dying. New congregations need to be planted while we help to renew spiritual health and growth in older congregations. We envision helping to plant 10 new congregations in the next few years.

Muslim Evangelism—The Muslim influence is growing in America. The largest population of Arabic Muslims is in Dearborn, Michigan. We want to help plant an evangelistic church and ministry base in the heart of this community. The evangelist and initial leader of this new congregation is Wissam Al-Aethawi, an Iraqi convert from Islam and recent Sunset graduate.

Evangelistic Outreach—We must do more to help our congregations reach the lost in their communities. By partnering with outreach ministries like World Bible School, HomeMissions and Gospel Sharing Ministry, our faculty and student body can help churches in America grow through more evangelism.

Spanish Ministry—Hispanics are America's largest minority group. While that ethnic population is growing exponentially, Spanish-speaking congregations are typically not growing. We plan to train more Spanish-speaking preachers and help equip their congregations for spiritual health and growth.

To expand current ministries and begin a number of new ministries will require a significant increase in financial support. The good news is that many of you have been faithful in giving to this ministry and continue to support Sunset faithfully. We are thankful to God for you.



The Guiding Hand

From its early beginnings, Sunset International Bible Institute (previously Sunset School of Preaching) has been under the oversight of the Sunset Church of Christ eldership. The Sunset congregation's eldership serves as the board of directors for the school. Through the years, there have been discussions about the best structure for the institute, and it has always come back to the fact that the current arrangement is the most effective and efficient. There is a close relationship between the two organizations. The institute's residential campus is housed in Sunset's church building along with the faculty and staff offices. Residential classes are conducted in classrooms that are jointly used between the church and the institute. It has been remarked by some that the Sunset church building is one of the most utilized church buildings in the brotherhood. Both entities benefit from each other. The excellent instructors in the school serve as a great resource to the congregation in preaching and teaching, and the institute benefits from classroom and office space, utilities, and guidance from the congregation's eldership. Truitt Adair, SIBI president, has said many times that he would not want the arrangement to be any other way. He believes the institute needs to be under the direction of a local eldership. That accountability is important, and time has proven this arrangement to be very beneficial for both entities. Bob Crockett, one of Sunset's elders, serves as chairman for SIBI's board of directors. He and Truitt work closely together. Important decisions including budget approval and hiring of teaching personnel are always vetted by the board of directors. This responsibility residing within the eldership has proven to be very valuable in maintaining doctrinal purity



As an update to the ongoing search for a new president to follow Truitt, the presidential search committee is currently investigating a group of qualified candidates. Please continue to keep the committee and the selection process in your prayers.

PASSING THE BATON

AIM is always changing. It was in 1973 that the AIM program began as young people simply responded to a missionary's call for help. After spending 18 months serving in Dublin, Ireland, they returned home to share their stories, and others wanted to do the same thing.

Several people were instrumental in helping in the early days, such as Nat Cooper, Limon Marinas and Sam Coffey. However, it soon became clear that it would require a full-time director if this program were to be successful. Don Solomon was chosen as the first full-time director in 1977. Don was successful in setting the foundation of the program upon which future directors would build. In 1983, Don and Joanne moved to Scotland, and the baton was passed to Rex so long, Pat Sheaffer and I have worked side by side. We're often referred to as Batman and Robin or other dynamic duos. I was always proud of that description and value him as one of my very best friends. I don't think I would have lasted nearly as long as director if it had not been for Pat. It has also been a blast to work every day with my best friend and wife, Barb. I certainly could not have done this work without her support. We all know that she really runs the show anyway. I think the real heroes though are these young men and women scattered around the room tonight. They're the ones who have raised their hands and were simply willing to be used by God to reach a lost world. They've walked by faith through the good times and the tough times, and we have continually seen the incredible

value that they offer the mission fields around the world.

We truly love this great work. While these past years have been an incredible experience, honor and blessing for Barbara and me, we realize that it's time to pass the baton on to someone with more energy. That man is Cory Burns. Cory came to AIM in 1996 and served in Moscow, Russia. Afterward, he completed SIBI while also serving as an AIM assistant. In 2005, he and Toni moved their family to Guadalajara, Mexico, where they served on a mission

team for nearly 10 years. Cory coordinated AIM teams in Mexico, and in 2014 we invited Cory to come and work with us here as our AIM staff director. I'm excited for the future of the AIM program as Cory brings his energy, experience, vision and leadership to this team.

I know that Barb and I will always be involved in ministry of some kind, but now it will be fun to watch AIM from a different angle. I believe God really has brought Cory and Toni here at just the right time.

Boyles, who became the second full-time director of AIM. Some of the greatest changes to the program happened under Rex's leadership, such as extending the classroom training from five months to eight, the idea of AIM assistants, area churches, the Mexico City trip and mission term. It was in 1993 that Jay Jarboe was recruited from Mexico City to work with Rex, and in 1995, Jay became the next AIM director. Jay brought a strong passion for missions, prayer and excellence.

In 1998, Jay invited me to join the AIM staff as the missions coordinator. Within a few years, that role transitioned into the fourth director of AIM until

this day. So many of the decisions that I've made over the years were directly influenced from what I learned from Jay.

I've made some of the best friends of my life while working with AIM, and I'm so thankful to Barry Day, Jason Thornton and Robby Stephen for making this work not only high quality but also it's just been plain fun working alongside these guys. Ben Walker showed us how valuable missionary care is, and Chris Johnson has taken his own passion and experience in that area and continued to build on it. For

Please See Me

Please see me!" was the theme of Bob Anderson's talk at the 2017 Sunset Workshop banquet. "The Deaf speak with their hands, their eyes, their hearts, their body language. They want to be seen and heard." Bob has been a part of the Sunset deaf program for 35 years, but his story didn't begin in a classroom

at Sunset. It began on a pew in a small church in Chicago on March 1, 1942. A young

boy heard the Gospel preached, walked down to the front and said, "I believe in Jesus Christ," and was baptized. Always sitting next to him was his older brother—a brother who had never heard a sermon, a song, or a prayer, who could not read or write, who was deaf. One brother had always heard about Jesus and one had never heard about Him.

There was an elder at the congregation who wanted his son to attend Harding. This elder convinced Bob's parents to send Bob to Harding as well. Bob's story was planned in the heart of God and carried out in the halls of Harding. In 1949, one of Bob's classmates mentioned to a group that he wanted to begin a sign language class. Only Bob's hand

went up. Bob went to Sam's home and began to learn hand signs and the alphabet. Harding opened the doors for Bob to learn and teach sign. He worked with Sam and a group in Little Rock, Arkansas, to teach deaf children about God. God sent Hollis Maynard to learn from and with Bob. What history these two have made in the Deaf world and around

the world. "I raised my hand one time, and now 60 years later many people are still learning sign language with me," said Bob. Bob has a bachelor of arts degree in Bible and biblical languages and a master of arts degree in religious education. He has preached in Indianapolis, Indiana,

Bob began teaching with Hollis at Sunset in the fall of 1982. They took turns interpreting the hearing classes, teaching deaf classes, and interpreting for the Sunset church on Sundays. He has taught beginning sign language classes for hearing students and has taught the Hebrew language to the 7:30 early morning class. After Hollis left in 2011, Bob served as the director of the deaf program until Dennis Wilson came to SIBI in 2013. Dennis, the director



of the deaf work at SIBI now, knows first hand the love of Bob. Bob taught and baptized Dennis' parents, Arthur and Nancy, in 1959. Now, two generations later, Arthur and Nancy's grandchildren are on the mission field teaching sign to those who are neglected and forgotten. Rex and Abbie Wilson were sent through AIM to work with Mission UpReach in Honduras and

have started a government-recognized school for the Deaf. All of this has happened because one young man raised his hand.

"Please see me!" is a phrase Bob uses about the Deaf. They have hurts and problems. They have hopes and dreams. Bob is one of the most caring, kind, compassionate, soft-

> spoken and faithful men who has worked at Sunset. Not only does Bob teach in the school, but he is one of the main interpreters for the Sunset congregation. Bob has been to India, Romania, the Czech Republic and the Philippines working with the Deaf. He has taught hundreds of hearing and deaf people.

> At the end of this school year, Bob will be retiring from teaching at Sunset. For 60

years of sharing the Gospel, preaching and teaching with his hands and heart, Bob has been a great ambassador and advocate for the Deaf. SIBI and the Sunset congregation have been blessed with Bob's love for the Deaf.




NEW FACES












New Leadership for Asia Ministry Training

SOLAR EVENT PHASE III IN SPANISH

ver the past 15 months, funds have been collected, lessons have been translated and SD cards have been loaded. Now it is time for thanksgiving to God. Last year a few deliveries were made, but most of the 3,000 solar players for Phase III will be delivered in the next few months. While we are still receiving the remainder of the \$1,500,000 needed for completion of the project, enough has been received that many of the trips are already scheduled. At this point, plans have been made to deliver the remaining Spanish solar players to 13 countries: Argentina, Bolivia, Columbia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Peru, Puerto Rico, and Venezuela. Through these trips, God will be praised and thanksgiving will be made for the Word of God.

Two of those trips happened in February, with 200 solar players going to Mexico

February, with 200 solar players going to Mexico
City and 160 going to Honduras. Those delivered to
Mexico City will be used by missionaries to distribute
to churches and help equip members with the over 400
hours of biblical training that is available. The deliveries
in Honduras will be in partnership with Mission
UpReach and the Baxter Institute. Last year Richard
Baggett spoke to a group of Baxter Institute alumni at

sending AIM teams to help this ministry. Mission UpReach has a vision to plant 1,010 churches within their area of Honduras. Arthur Puente was able to train these church

planters with solar players to use as they develop leaders in these new churches.

an annual meeting to see what kind of interest these preachers would have in using this ministry training In March teams from Sunset continued to deliver solar

players into Central and South America. Tim Burow was able to take 75 players to Columbia. The original intent was for the players to be distributed in Venezuela, but due to the ongoing problems in that country, he was only able to deliver the remaining 75 through the border. Chris Swinford and Christian Thompson took 80 players to Costa Rica. Luis Melendez ('09) organized a meeting of church leaders

where they were trained how to effectively use the players to grow their churches and plant additional ones.

In October of 2016, we reported

about additional funds given to deliver 400 more solar players to Africa to continue the important work we began in Phases I & II. God has continued to put this need on the heart of a few key donors. In December, more funds were given for another 400 solar players to be taken to Africa. Many of the first additional 400 solar players have been delivered and more solar players will be delivered

as we are able to make trips to various locations in Africa.


LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Even as Phase III in Spanish continues in full force, steps are beginning to provide the same training material for other



languages. In response to the refugees that continue to pour into Europe, work has begun to translate material and provide training in Arabic. These Arabic solar players will be supplied to churches in Greece Germany that are working with refugees and

converting Muslims to Christ. Work has also begun to translate all of the Sunset courses into French. This will mean that an additional 220 million French speakers will be able to learn the Word of God and grow as leaders in Christ. This will enable Sunset to go to the 40% of Africa that speaks French.

Reaching Muslim Refugees

ince 2014, there has been much in the world media concerning the refugee crisis in Europe and Uthe Middle East. Immigration is a politically and emotionally charged subject with very passionate voices speaking on all sides of the issue. The American media has been filled with images of demonstrations and protestors. The numbers are staggering. Since 2014, over four million people from the Middle Eastern nations of Syria, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan and Egypt have applied to the





> In response to the crisis, Bill McDonough, Director of Partners in Progress, joined the Glyfada with Church of Christ to host the Athens Refugee Conference in

the war-torn nation of

November of 2016. Congregational leaders from across Europe were joined by key mission ministries from America. More than 100 people attended the five-day event. Those attending were impressed to hear from former Muslim immigrants who are now believers in Christ and serving in Athens and other European cities. The group was invited to visit a relief center operated by Hellenic Ministries where 200-300 immigrants receive a warm meal each week.

Rucker traveled from the United States. They were joined by Sunset graduates and co-workers from Bulgaria, Ukraine, Albania, Romania, Germany, Greece and other nations. It was an excellent opportunity to hear from European congregations reaching out to immigrants in their communities. Representatives from Sunset wanted to raise awareness of the resources currently available and to brainstorm on how Sunset can help congregations and missionaries respond to the crisis.

Christians are presented with a unique opportunity, and Sunset is working diligently to meet this urgent need. Sunset is working in cooperation with Eastern European Missions to translate quality study materials and Bibles into Arabic. Some of the materials being translated in Cairo include The Newcomer's Guide to the Bible and an illustrated Bible for adolescents. High on the list of priorities is to translate several of the World Bible School

Sunset is also producing audio recordings of all the translated materials for use on solar players and other personal electronic devices. These same recordings and written materials will be made available on a web page in Arabic hosted by Sunset at http://ar.sunsetonline.org.

> than to provide reading and listening materials. Congregations throughout Europe are desperate to know how best to reach out to refugees as they are relocated into their communities. Experienced evangelists such as Francis and Alfred Habashy are already coordinating plans to conduct outreach seminars and campaigns with European church leaders. The first campaign was in Bremen, Germany, in March.

Many from Sunset extended their stay in Athens beyond the November conference, allowing them time to pursue other contacts and learn more about what is being done for refugees and what needs still remain. There was no formal

plan or agenda. Francis and Alfred have developed good relationships with some of the Arabic-speaking believers in Greece. There is a group of Egyptians there who worship Christ, and Kamel, the leader of the group,

invited Wissam to share the story of his conversion. This was the first time Wissam had ever shared his story in his native language.

One of the church members offered to take the group to some of the relief camps, the very place the refugees are housed and held until they are relocated


into Europe. At a camp for families and single women, Alfred and Francis shared cookies, a smile, a kind word and simple compassion with the children and the apprehension melted away.

They also visited a camp for single men where security was tighter and no pictures were allowed. Some of the men had expressed an interest in knowing more about Jesus Christ. It was impossible to speak with them openly in the compound, so at a coffee shop a few blocks away, Francis, Alfred and Wissam talked with them. They had brought two solar players to Athens that had some Arabic materials installed, and Alfred gave these men one of the players as a gift. They were excited to have something to listen to, since they have little to do all day except watch TV and wait. The next morning, two of them wanted to visit at the hotel and learn more about Christ and His church. It was not long before they made the decision to be immersed into Christ for the forgiveness of their sins.

War is always a terrible experience resulting in of Jehovah Jireh which translated means "Lord who needless death, destruction, and untold suffering of the innocent. The civil war in Syria is no exception, but the war is having an unexpected impact on the thinking and beliefs of many Muslims. Many young people have witnessed firsthand the horrific war being waged by Muslims on other Muslims. They are abandoning a religion that advocates violence and murder, but they are unsure where to turn or whom to believe, leaving them searching and seeking for answers and peace.

There was a common message at the conference. The former Muslims said it was someone who cared for them that opened the door to learn about Christ. When refugees experienced the love of Christ, when they were shown Christian kindness, when given a warm meal or clean clothing, those small gestures had a profound

her husband and begin a new and better life. Her husband passed away only three months after their family was united in Athens, but Rosemary remained in Greece with her children. She learned about the Athens International Bible Institute from her friends and enrolled. It was a lifelong dream to study the Bible and serve others. Rosemary saw the growing number of homeless and poor in her neighborhood. She was aware of the refugees and immigrants on the streets of Athens.

One cold morning, she was waiting for the subway. The terminal was filled with the homeless trying to stay warm, and Rosemary decided that something had to be done. She returned to her house and prepared hot tea for as many as she could. That was the beginning

Provides." The ministry continues to grow. Rosemary has organized other mothers from Kenya, Ghana, Nigeria and Greece to help prepare meals and distribute clothing to the homeless. While others were attending the Athens Refugee Conference, Rosemary and her "moms" were

providing a warm meal for almost 1,000 people.

A former Muslim said during the conference a thought that deserves a response:

For a long time it has been impossible for you to come to me, but now God has brought me to you.

That is why a group of 30 Texans, mostly college students, traveled north to take part in advancing the Kingdom during their Spring Break.

We partnered with the Sunset Church of Christ in Taylor, Michigan. Their staff of Tad Mastellar, Jason Mastellar and Wissam Al-Ithawi did an amazing job organizing our projects and guiding us around the mission field they love. Our focus centered on two areas—

understanding Islam and serving the poor.

One of the highlights of our trip was being able to visit a mosque and observe the afternoon prayers. This was a unique experience that led to a greater understanding of Islam, the Quran and the Muslim world. The local Imam shared the five tenants of Islam and then allowed us to ask him any question. Our students asked some great questions about the differences between Islam and Christianity. Afterward, Wissam helped debrief our visit with a session he entitled "Islam Myth Busters."

Throughout the week, we were also able to serve the poor in various ways. We volunteered at a local food pantry, assisted the Westside Church of Christ with food distribution, prepped & painted the Vinewood Church of Christ parsonage in Mexicantown and engaged many homeless in prayer as we shared sack meals. We also spent some valuable time meeting with some shut-in and elderly members of the Sunset congregation.

It was a fantastic week of outreach and ministry that will pay dividends for those we met and those who went. Now we can say some very "nice things about Detroit," and DiscipleTrips looks forward to returning there next summer. Let us know if you'd like to be a part of the team!






