ears ago, Cline Paden was asked why Sunset didn't place more ads for the school in brotherhood publications. His reply was the now famous statement, "We train our advertisements." These days we place more ads in various media, but it is still true that our most effective advertisements are the people we

train, our alumni. We depend on alumni to send us students, to support the school, to recommend us to congregations and Christian individuals. We look forward to meeting alumni at brotherhood events and hearing the exciting stories of how God is using them to serve. We look forward to speaking at their congregations and hearing good reports from grateful leaders. We look forward to the hugs and handshakes of the

joyful reunion when alumni return to Sunset for some special event during the school year. However, our greatest joy is knowing that thousands of alumni have faithfully served in all fifty states and over a hundred foreign nations. Most are out there quietly doing what they

were trained to do: preaching, teaching, evangelizing, planting churches, making disciples. In this publication, we will be able to mention only a few representatives from each decade. It would be impossible to tell you of a host of unsung heros who have forfeited worldly wealth, suffered all kinds of hardships, endured unjust criticism, given unselfishly of time and talent, exposed themselves to untold dangers, never expecting recognition or earthly reward.

Now in our fifth decade of ministry training we have witnessed the loss of several hundred of these heros of faith who now "rest from their labors" with the church victorious. Many "died with their boots on," evangelizing with their last ounce of strength at some remote foreign outpost. Others gave their

heart to a small rural congregation and then after years of service, suffered a heart attack in the very pulpit where their sermons blessed the hearts of several generations. Still others wasted away physically in a hospital of some terminal disease while preaching to their doctors and nurses. We honor the memory of these faithful dead by training the next generation to "stand in the gap" and continue the Sunset Alumni tradition of commitment to God's word, evangelistic fervor and the love of preaching.

It is worthy of note that the alumni spotlighted in this publication from past decades were primarily traditional resident students. Our resident studies program continues to be healthy, strong and growing but the student population in other training sectors is literally exploding. We are now approaching 1000 students in our combined international schools but even that is overshadowed by the thousands studying in our video satellite schools. Now with a rapidly growing student base in online

Once a pig farmer...

Milton Caraway graduated from the Sunset School of Preaching in 1969. He and Shirlene celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in June, 2006. They have four children, thirteen grandchildren and one great granddaughter.

Milton, can you say something of how Sunset changed your life?

Sunset was the turning point in our lives. Shirlene and I were baptized at the Sunset church in October, 1958. I graduated from Texas Tech on June 1, 1959; I went into business as a hog farmer. Cline Paden was the man who challenged me to quit feeding people's bodies and start feeding their souls. It took a couple of years before I determined I could no longer farm. I then graduated from Sunset School of Preaching on June 29, 1969. God certainly used Sunset to change our

Because of Cline and Sunset, I was able to share the Gospel, not only in the churches listed but in the Iron Curtain countries of Austria, Yugoslavia, Romania and Bulgaria in early 1973, North Ireland in 1978 and 1979, Botswana and South Africa in early 1980's and 1990's, Guatemala in 1992 and Perm, Russia, in January and February, 1995. As a farmer I would never have dreamed of such opportunities had it not been for our



Heavenly Father, and for Cline Paden and his challenge. For almost 40 years now, my greatest joy has been in sharing the Gospel from the pulpit and in the homes of the lost.

IRA ROLLOVER GIFT (2006 - 2007)

The Pension Protection Act passed by Congress in 2006 now allows distributions from IRA's to qualifying charities tax free during 2006 and 2007. If you are an IRA owner, age 70 ½ or older, you may now make a gift up to \$100,000 directly to Sunset International Bible Institute. Plus, the IRA charitable rollover will qualify for your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). What have you been doing since leaving Sunset?



I continue to remain busy in my teaching schedule at Harding as I returned full-time to the classroom in the Fall of 2006. I am also involved in writing commentaries




on The Gospel of John and the Epistles of John (Resource Publications); and want to complete my commentary on Daniel.

Duane Morgan

Missionary to the world...



Duane Morgan is a 1970 graduate of Sunset School of Preaching. He has spent most of his life since then as a missionary, first to Indonesia, and now to the Muslim world.

Duane, why was attending Sunset important to you?

I wrote to Cline Paden from Jakarta, Indonesia, on June 7, 1998: Dear Cline.

It has been thirty years since what many are calling "the year the dream died." Martin Luther King, Jr. and Robert Kennedy were assassinated; Lyndon Johnson's political career ended as

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Richard Nixon's star rose; hope for victory in Vietnam died forever; racial conflict threatened to split the nation; and a whole generation lost their innocence. 1968 is now and forever recorded as a pivotal moment in American history... but 1968 has a very different significance for me. It's the year I became a student at Sunset School of Preaching. Every day in chapel we sang "The Lord Will Find a Way For Me," "Send the Light," "I Have Decided to Follow Jesus," and other songs that profoundly stirred our souls. Richard, Ed. Dayton, Bill, Parker, Abe, and Tex thrilled us with insights into God's eternal purpose and visions of the limitless possibilities of our generation.

1968 was the year my dream was born; and I thank you for that, brother. God bless you.

Briefly tell us what you have been doing up until today.

I served as a missionary in Papua New Guinea for 3 ½ years, 1971-74.

I have worked in Irian Jaya, Indonesia (the western half of the island of New Guinea), since 1985. During that time, congregations have been established

there and in other locations in the Republic of Indonesia. A Bible training school established in Irian Jaya in 1988 is in its 19th year of operation.

Since 2004 I have gradually phased out of the ministry in Indonesia and begun preparation and planning for missions to the Arabic speaking world.

I have preached and taught in several languages

over the years, developed Bible teaching materials in those languages, and participated in arranging for and financing the translation, publication, and distribution of Bible teaching materials throughout Indonesia.

I have no permanent address at the moment, as I'm traveling from Marseille, France, to various locations in North Africa and the Middle East. Recently I have spent time in Jordan, Lebanon, and Greece.

You came to school all those years ago with children. Can you tell us more about them today?




The Sehudate Tribe at the village of Otodemo are an unchurched people. Otodemo is toward the headwaters of the Wapoga River and is the gateway to the tribes yet to be reached in Irian Jaya, Indonesia. They welcomed me when I walked thirty miles to be among them last year. Here we work together to build a native-materials building in which to meet.

We cleared the land, cut the trees with axes. and erected the building on their tribal property, all at their initiative.

Leslie Dawn is my firstborn child. She is now 39 years old and lives in Austin, Texas, where she works for REI (Recreation Equipment Inc.). Ron is the second child, now 37 years old. He's in the Army and on duty in Iraq. Amy, age 35, is a registered nurse at Seton Hospital in Austin. Tyler is 18 years old and lives in Christiansburg, Virginia. I have one granddaughter, Kacey, and a great-grandson, Kaden.

When Walter and Pauline graduated from Sunset School of Preaching, they returned to Roosevelt, New York and Walter became the evangelist for the Roosevelt Freeport Church of Christ. Today, 37 years later, he still preaches for the same congregation!

Walter has spoken in gospel meetings, lectureships, youth rallies and at colleges across the United States and Bermuda.


How has that understanding "translated" into what you have done in the

last 30 years?

After graduation in 1976 we went to work with a church of 20 members in Plainwell, Michigan. In 5 years, God opened the doors to hundreds of Bible studies, 164 baptisms, and a self-supported, excited congregation.

In 1981 we returned to our hometown of Rochester, MI, where I had served as a deacon before going to Sunset. God blessed our work together in many ways. For 25 years, through pulpit preaching and evangelism, we grew to a church of over 1000, serving the needs of the community. The last 5 years I concentrated my efforts on community outreach and teaching others to do personal evangelism.

With much encouragement from Sunset I did a video series and wrote a book entitled, "His Eternal Plan." They illustrate the method of teaching that I have developed over the past 30 years. I began conducting evangelism workshops across



the country. By January, 2006, the requests for workshops required us to finally leave Rochester. We sold everything, purchased a motor home and are now doing workshops full time. We have been to 32 places this first year. What an awesome journey this has been.

Roland and Rose Mohsen are in their 23rd year of ministry with the Deodat Church of Christ in Paris, France. They are 1978 graduates of Sunset School of Preaching and 1979 graduates of the School of Missions at Sunset. This is a small part of their story.

The Early Years

in Toulon, South France. His father was an Arabian Muslim and his mother a French Catholic. In addition to regular school he had extensive additional training in radio and television electronics and has owned a thriving electronics business when he lived in Saudi Arabia. Anna Rose Wilson is from Reidsburg, Pennsylvania. They were married in 1969 and made their home in Pennsylvania. They have two daughters, Anna Magdalene and Mary Rose. Both daughters are now married and also live with their families in France.

Conversion and Training

Rose became a Christian in 1972. The next year a short-term mission team of Sunset students supported by the First Street congregation in Dumas, Texas traveled to Pennsylvania for campaign

work. Sammy Flanary ('74) studied with and baptized Roland. After operating a successful bakery business for several years the Mohsens sold their business and moved to Lubbock to be trained in the Bible. They then stayed an additional year for Missions training, completing their schooling in 1979.

Ministry

By July 1979, Roland and Rose were in Dijon, France, working full time in the Lord's work with the Yann Opsitch and Serge Rossi families. After six years, they moved to Paris, beginning their work there on December 20, 1984. Today the Deodat congregation has about 140 members from 21 nations, and is the largest Church of Christ in all of Europe. In France (popu-

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lation 62,500,000) there are six congregations totaling 340 members.

Roland is the only French born missionary in France. Rose has a weekly study group of 27 and Roland studies weekly with seven. Roland has baptized 290 in the last 27 years. Of the 18 families

that have done mission work in France, Roland and Rose are the only ones remaining in Paris.

"We have learned much in our service within France and wish to serve many years there for the Lord, and expect to continue to learn as well as teach others. We ask that you pray for us and support us for the Kingdom's growth because of

Our plea is that you will support this work with your prayers, money and letters as well as visits for vourself that you may see the work firsthand and meet the Christians that are our family here in Paris and other areas of France. Would you tell us a little about your ministry since graduation?


I presently am the evangelist for the Central Lubbock Church of Christ and the Executive Director for Inside Out Ministries. Since 1984 I have preached for three other congregations: Parkway Drive and 20th and Birch in Lubbock, and the West Adams congregation in Los Angeles, California.

For twelve years the ministries of the

Central Lubbock Church, called the Inside Out Ministries, were designed to help men and women to recover from addictions, assimilate ex-offenders coming out of prison into a productive lifestyle, and provide an after school program for primary-aged children to help them avoid a life of drugs, gangs and criminal activity. The ultimate purpose is to lead all to the Lord Jesus.

We are changing the emphasis of the ministries beginning in January 2007. We believe we can be more effective if we focus on preventing rather than attempting to cure the problem. We are putting our efforts toward the children of the neighborhood who struggle in these dysfunctional circumstances. We will also target those individuals and families that addiction. criminality and or otherwise destructive relationships have hurt. We will welcome those families that are hurting and are committed to building loving healthy relationships with them.

In addition to graduation from Sunset, I have a BA degree from Lubbock Christian University. I have served on the Board of Directors for Covenant Medical Center, Christian Women's Job Corp, and Lubbock Hope and Help Center. I have conducted Marriage and Family Seminars and



Addiction Seminars for the Churches of Christ in Texas, California and Kentucky. I am a guest speaker for Lubbock Christian University, the Annual Parenting Conference and Women's Protective Services. I worked four years as a counselor for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. I have just completed my first devotional book. I am also co-authoring with Dr. Shera Atkinson of Texas Tech a book on

How did your time at Sunset benefit you?

Doctrinally, I was most profoundly impacted by a deep conviction concerning the glorious "truth of the gospel", that is, justification by faith. Practically speaking, I gained a perspective for missions that has guided much of my ministry since.

Would you give us a brief synopsis of what you have done since graduation?

We have been in Monahans since graduating from Sunset in 1997. I served as the congregation's primary minister until 2005, when we were blessed with the arrival of another Sunset graduate, Billy Reed (a "cotton farmer" from Ackerly, Texas who graduated in 2002).

In addition to preaching, I have become deeply involved with the community and have recently been elected as the County Judge. I now work full-time for the county,

but I continue to preach for the church each Sunday morning and Brother Reed now serves as the congregation's full-time minister.

During our time in Monahans, the church has been instrumental in establishing and maintaining the Sunset branch school in Athens, Greece. The school has taught students from more than twenty different nations and has produced thirty-five graduates. Alumni from the school have returned to more than ten nations to spread the gospel. I have been heavily involved in the Athens work as we have sponsored and helped to support each member of the school's faculty. It is a work which is dear to my heart, and it occupies a great deal of my focus in ministry.

I'm grateful to my supporters, instructors and fellow students who changed the course of my life in such tremendous ways. I trust that the Lord "ain't done with me" yet.

- We have an annual July 4th cook-out that includes local congregations and is well attended.
- · We have started a program to feed the poor in our community.

- · We began an annual fish fry that is open to the community and is well attended.
- · We now have a men's breakfast and devotional which includes 30% of the men in congregation.
- I have become a resource for a number of ministers in this area.
- We allow the local high school to utilize our facilities for peer-mediation training.

Overall, the initial goals I set for myself have been accomplished. We now have one additional elder and four deacons in

the church. I try to support the local congregations to aid in their growth as well. I feel that I have developed a reputation in this area of being spiritually and biblically sound. Included in our satellite school classes are members of the International church of Christ. I am planning far more things in the near future.



The Difference Women Have Made

hile most of our attention seems to focus on men who have gone on from Sunset and White's Ferry Road to various areas of service, a valuable part of our alumni have scarcely been mentioned. Most men who came to school were married: others married while in school. In addition, a number of single women came of their own accord to get Bible training. Bobbie Paden, the first Dean of Women at Sunset, and Betty Tracy, the present Dean, provided the following article.

Over four decades ago, a few disgruntled women helped begin a program that is flourishing today! When the place we now know as Sunset International Bible Institute was in its early years of operation, one of the main challenges it was facing were a few unhappy wives. Not a situation most of us would like to be dealing with!

In the words of Cline Paden, here's what was taking place...


"In the winter of 1963, a problem arose from an unexpected source which threatened to bring the fledgling program to a screeching halt. Unknown to the administration, there was a growing resentment against the school on the part of the wives of the students. They resented the fact that due to an "exaggerated study load" being borne by the students, that the men had no time to be "husbands and fathers". The wives were tired of being "widowed" from their husbands. And in a strongly worded ultimatum they made the director understand that they had had it up to their nausea buttons. WHAT TO DO ABOUT IT? The answer was not immediately forthcoming. After a series of meetings with the wives to help defuse the explosive nature of the little uprising, eventually what had really provoked their irritation was brought to the surface. The women later admitted that they were really more upset that they were NOT BEING GIVEN ANY BIBLE INSTRUC-TION AT ALL and that their husbands were being given too much. It's amazing what a few Bible classes did for the morale of the whole school".

The Women's Program at the Sunset International Bible Institute has come a long way since that time back in 1963. We now have a format that meets the needs of any woman that wants to attend ... continued on next page

classes. The mission of this department is to train godly women to be better equipped in order to serve in the area of ministry. Whether it is working along side their husband, being part of a mission team or just serving as an effective member of the Lord's church, we're working hard to offer an environment that encourages and nurtures women to achieve their highest potential of service.

So many talented, gifted and dedicated women have walked the halls of Sunset. Today, some walk on foreign soils as missionaries, others walk along side their husbands in congregational ministries, while many others walk daily with co-workers in the corporate world; all making attempts to share the good news about Christ.

No article would be large enough to hold all of the quotes from the women who have been a part of Sunset, but here are a couple that may help offer a little insight to the women's program.

"My experience at SSOP (now SIBI) is best described as a rendition of the Velveteen Rabbit. I came to Lubbock very loved, but also very worn and tired. Through God's word, I became "real". God's word is not just taught here – it is in everyday speech. It is lived! And through the teaching, speaking and living, I too became alive in Him. To God be the glory!"

"When I was single (and even once after I was married) I had a number of times when I was asked, 'What in the world is a woman doing going through a preaching school? To this I would calmly explain that Sunset is not just a preaching school, and I would share with them about the women's program." Robin Worrell Lane

Bobbie Paden, Dean of Women (1976-1998), has this to say about a graduate of the women's program.

"Many women do noble things ...a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. Give her the reward she has eamed and let her works bring her praise at the city gate." (Proverbs 31:29-31)

"Does God have a place for a woman to serve who is 53 years old, divorced and has no money? The answer is yes, if she has the faith and determination of Doris Morrison. Doris came to Sunset in 1994 saying, 'I want to study the Bible and go to a mission field.' Her time here presented it's struggles, but she graduated from the two-year program in 1996 and returned to graduate from missions studies in 2002.

After several attempts to work things out for different mission fields, she has found "her field" in Cambodia. Her mission there is to teach children the Bible using the English language. Her desire is to live there as long as the Lord gives her the strength.

Truly her works will bring her 'praise at the city gate."

The main challenge today with the women's program is the difficulty in which many of the students find themselves in financially. Many of the married women find themselves working due to the lack of support for their family. Instead of learning along side their husbands they must sac-

rifice and work in order for their husbands to attend school. Most single women find support difficult to locate due to the misconception about why they are here. There are so many avenues open to single women in ministry and sadly they're overlooked far too often. These women, both married and single, have capabilities that stretch all the way from working on mission teams, interpreting for the deaf, leading women's bible studies and classes to working along side their husbands in pulpit ministries.

Terri Fanning, Dean of Women (1997-2005) sums up our thoughts about the women's program here at Sunset...

"Our school continues to be committed to training and equipping women to face the challenges of this millennium. Women are blessed with specific, God—given abilities. Sunset eagerly anticipates the opportunity to help each woman be all that God has designed her to be. The Sunset experience will help each woman to know the Lord more intimately and serve Him more effectively".

Alumni News

Africa

Behailu Abebe, dean of branch schools in Ethiopia, reports that more than 500,000 people receive clean, uncontaminated drinking water instead of dead ponds infested with bacteria and algae as a result of the well drilling project. Five of the 17 wells contracted remain to be drilled. Massive flooding has caused widespread devastation with 400 dead, over 30,000 homeless and more than 400 are missing in the Eastern, Southern and Northern parts of Ethiopia. More than 9,000 hectares (about 22,000 acres) of farmland were destroyed and the government is unable to provide assistance. This is the worst flooding in the history of Ethiopia. John Ed Clark reports that Tegenu Worku recently traveled to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia where he was baptized. Tegenu stayed for further study before returning to Arsi, Asasa, Ethiopia with a box filled with World Bible School (WBS) lessons. He is conducting worship services

for six of his students who obeyed the gospel. These new Christians are teaching more than 100 others using the WBS

material. This is the first congregation in the Arsi area.

Construction on the new Level II Preacher Training facility continues. This new building includes a dorm that will house up to 20 students, a kitchen, a dining room, a bathroom and a quest room for visiting preachers and teachers. A

half basement will be used to store food and other supplies. Drip irrigation survival gardens provide much of the stored food and continue to be taught as a ministry to demonstrate to the people the desire that Christians have to help them spiritually as well as physically.

Chris Swinford ('89) dean of Sunset's International Studies, recently traveled with several others to the Nigerian Institute for Arts and Theological Studies (NIATS) near Aba, Nigeria to discuss the possibility of a future affiliation with Sunset. This same compound houses the Nigerian Christian Hospital, a secondary school, and a high school. Dr. Bob Whitaker provides medical services, trains native doctors and nurses. and teaches the gospel to many. His wife, Annette, works with both schools providing high quality education to Nigerians. The NIATS originally began as a Bible Training College in 1957, but due to unfortunate circumstances it closed 1988. The school reopened in 1999. Chris also represented Sunset in Ikot Usen, Nigeria, investigating the possibility of entering into an agreement with the CAO Essien school directed by Sunset graduate, Sunday Ekanem ('73). This school was built on the same site where the first congregation of the church of Christ in Nigeria was established.

Jerry and Ann Hogg ('68) are adjunct teachers in the South African Bible School (SABS). Jerry conducted several seminars which were openly received by participants from 17 different congregations. Jerry visited the Nhowe Mission where he taught 1300 students and staff three times a day in the main assembly on "Leadership" from the book of Nehemiah. Jerry also spoke for a week at the Mapepe Bible College, a Sunset Associate school, in Lusaka, Zambia.

Isaya ('97) Jackson is preaching and teaching in Sudan and Uganda. Isaya reports their house in Juba. South Sudan is completed and is being used as a place of worship until they can move to a public meeting place. Lina spent two days in the hospital with malaria; Kennedy Shuruma ('05) spent many days in the hospital in Kampala, suffering from malaria and iaundice after returning

from one of his South Sudan trips. After recovering, he traveled to southwest Uganda at the Yumbe refugee camp to visit and teach the congregation before returning to Kiryandongo refugee camp. Isaya and Kennedy have registered the church with the new government and have applied for resident visas in South Sudan. As soon as the church registration is complete they will be ready to start building a permanent structure to house a new Preacher Training School.

A new congregation in Obbo, South Sudan has about 60 in attendance. The congregations in Lobone and Obbo witnessed 30 people responding to the gospel and were baptized. Five more were added to the church at Maki Okolo. The village of Aweno Olwi received a visit from Robert Okonga. 103 people were baptized starting a new congregation. The Loguruny church is averaging 70 in attendance. Kennedy continues to work in the refugee camps teaching the people and preparing them to return to their homes when the UN repatriation process begins. The United Nations repatriation of refugees from Uganda has not yet started. Thousands of people have already returned to South Sudan from Uganda; however, when they go on their own, they are not eligible for financial assistance from the UN.

Albania

Steve Stamatis, serves as dean of the International Bible Institute of Albania. Steve reports that IBIA completed the first year of classes in December. Four full-time students have diligently finished the Level I courses and will begin Level II in January 2007. Three of the students live in the IBIA residence. Traveling expenses, working expenses, scholarships, and computers are needed. If you can help, please contact Steve at dig4truth@yahoo.com.

Asia

George Carman ('68) serves as dean of International Ministry Training - Asia for Sunset. George reports his travels this year includes Phnom Penh, Cambodia where he taught Bible History I to 10 students at the Cambodia Bible College. Melissa welcomed her parents and brother to Joao Pessoa where they started a trip together. They traveled to Salvador, Curitiba, Sao Luiz, and Aracaju. Three families from Salvador are working as missionaries in Curitiba. One of the missionaries broadcasts a gospel radio message for an hour each day. Since he had the day off, Melissa's brother and Dad delivered the message. While in Sao Luiz, they did a survey for future missionaries wanting to know about the city. The receptivity was good. 
How Old Does One Have to Be?
